
How to help your child with spelling


Phonic knowledge is a way into spelling and should continue to underpin spelling after Key Stage 1.

The question and answer poster pictured here reminds children of the spelling/writing strategy taught at LCS. With this strategy they can attempt to spell independently.

Reading a broad range of books will ensure words are seen and embedded in children's long term memory too.

The following slides provide a variety of fun ways to help with learning to spell. Please explore the below ideas with your child.



Talk about the rule the children will have been taught in class

What is your spelling rule this week?

Discuss root words and word meanings.

Week 1 Words with a /shuhn/ sound, spelt with 'sion' (if root word ends in 'se', 'de' or 'd')

expansion

extension

comprehension

tension

E.g. our spelling rule is the 'sion' ending. Investigate the root words before the ending is changed to 'sion'. E.g. expand -> expansion What changed? Talk about the meaning of the words together.



The variety of ways children can practice the rule/pattern

Look, say, cover, write, check

Beat the clock

Use an etymological dictionary to find out where the words comes from

Look, say, cover, write, check

- 1. Start with a list of words that you want your child to spell (make sure to give them some easier ones, as well as some that are more challenging we want them to enjoy spelling, not fear it!)
- Look at the word carefully. Pay attention to not just the letters and their order, but also the shape they make on the page.
- Say it aloud. Say the word as you would normally say it, and then enunciate any silent letters (e.g. 'Wed-nes-day').
- 4. Use a piece of paper or your hand to cover the word.
- 5. Using your memory, write the word down!
- 6. Check your answer letter by letter. If you've made a mistake don't worry! Write it out again correctly you'll get it next time!



Beat the clock

If your child is competitive, what better way to get them excited about learning than challenging them to spell against the clock?


It's as simple as it sounds. Read out a word (or a few!) and get your child to either spell it aloud or write it down. See how fast they can do it! Then, repeat this activity each day to see if they can beat their time!







Make up a mnemonic


Make up an acronym by using the letters of the word (or part of the word) you want to remember

Spot the mistake


Each sentence below has one word which is spelt incorrectly. Circle the incorrect word and write the correct spelling in the box.
